## BAHONA COLLEGE

### An Introduction

**B**ahona College is an institute of Higher Education in the North East corner of Jorhat that offers Higher Secondary and Undergraduate courses both in Arts and Science. On 1, 2 and 3 Oct., 2016 the college celebrated Golden Jubilee of its glorious existence. In the second cycle of accreditation of the NAAC, awarded the college B Grade (2.71 point, B+ as per new scale).

Bahona College started its relentless effort of imparting quality higher education on 15th July, 1966 with a handful of students. A delegation of academics, educationists and organisers led by visionary Ram Kr. Boruah established the college in a green sprawling location. Today the college can boast of more than 1099 students and one hundred teaching and non-teaching staff.

Apart from regular courses, the college now offers PG Courses in Arts under the Directorate of Distance Education of Dibrugarh University and UG Programmes under Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University. A Biotech Hub, funded by the Department of Science and Technology is managed and maintained by the Life Sciences Department of the college, offers hands-on-research experiences to the concerned students & faculty.

The large Indoor stadium of the college is equipped with a multigym facility and training infrastructure for indoor games, Martial art and Yoga, run by expert instructors.

The Girls' Hostel, inside the college campus, houses nearly 82 students from different places, particularly from Majuli. The Boys' Hostel, funded by the ONGC is located in another campus nearby has a capacity of 65 seats.

### Environment

Set in a sprawling campus, the college building is surrounded by shade trees, ornamental plants, fruit trees and seasonal flowers in a riot of colours. Free from unhealthy campus activities, Bahoma College can boast of a healthy and serene environment.

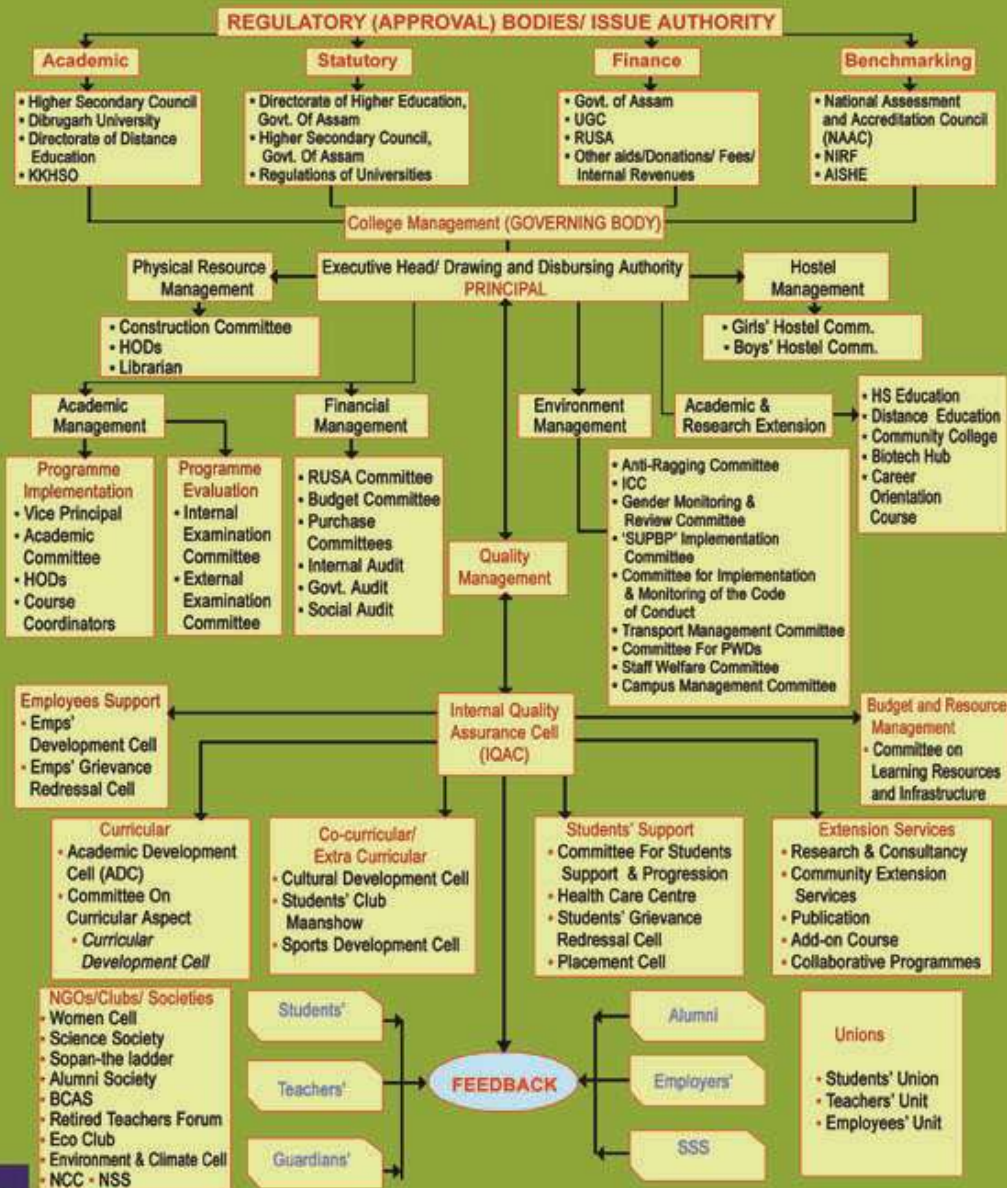

- ALL SCANNED DOCUMENTS ( MARKSHEETS, CERTIFICATES, PHOTOGRAPH, SIGNATURE etc.) should conform to the SIZE (must not exceed 5 MB) and TYPE (.jpg, .jpeg or .png formats) specified in the instructions.
- A VALID EMAIL ID and WORKING MOBILE NUMBER(S) are a MUST.
- MERIT LIST(S) WILL BE PREPARED by the ONLINE ADMISSION COMMITTEE and applicants in the Merit List would be intimated to take admission in Stipulated time.
- THOSE WHO FAIL to Take Admission on or before the Last Day of Admission will FOREFEIT their SEATS.
- FEES MUST BE PAID ONLINE using any digital transaction method or payment gateways and all relevant information regarding such transactions are to be provided for successful completion of admission. (Admission fees may be applicable as per latest Govt. rules and regulations.)

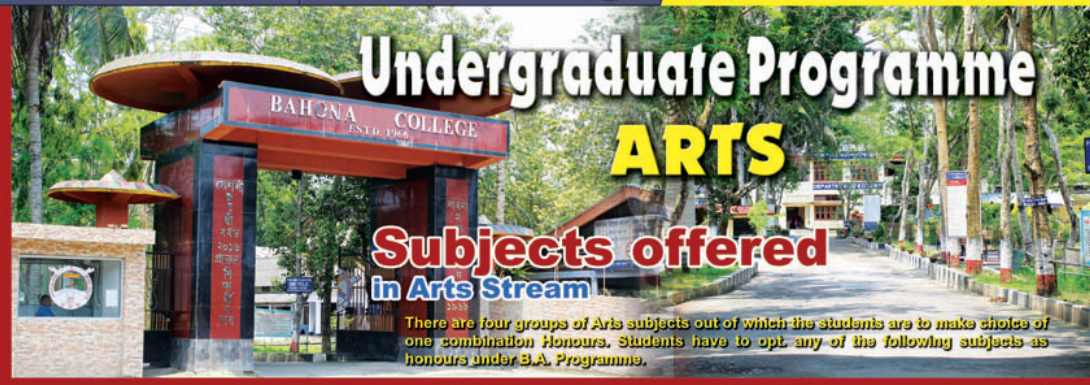

## Important Sections of Dibrugarh University Regulations for the Undergraduate Academic Programmes in the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), 2018

(Approved in the meeting of Academic Council of D. U. on 21.11.2018)

### (1) Short title, definitions and commencement:

These Regulations shall be called the Dibrugarh University Regulations for the Under Graduate Academic Programmes in the Choice Based Credit System, 2018. These Regulations shall be effective for the Courses of Study leading to the Bachelor Degree(s) in Arts (BA), Science (B.Sc.) and Commerce (B.Com), which shall be of three years duration comprising of six semesters. Hereinafter, it will be referred to as DU-JGBCS Regulations, 2018. The Regulations shall come into effect from the Academic Session, 2019-2020. The Regulations shall be applicable to the students enrolled in the aforementioned Academic Programmes under CBCS conducted by the Colleges/ Institutes affiliated to/ permitted by Dibrugarh University from the Academic session 2019-2020.

### Definitions:

- a) **CBCS:** CBCS means Choice Based Credit System. Choice Based Credit System is a flexible system of learning. 'Credit' defines the quantum of contents/ syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required.
- b) **College:** The term 'College' means the Colleges and Institutes affiliated to or permitted by Dibrugarh University for conducting different academic programmes.
- c) **Department:** The term 'Department' is used to mean a Department of a College/ Institute affiliated to/ permitted by Dibrugarh University.
- d) **Programme:** The term 'programme' is used to mean the whole learning experience or combination of courses in a particular field of study.
- e) **Course:** A Programme is divided into a number of courses. A course is a unit of instruction or segment of subject area under any programme. The traditional concept 'paper' is replaced by 'course'.
- f) **Academic Year:** An academic year means a period of twelve months consisting of two semesters.
- g) **Semester:** The word "semester" is used to mean a half-yearly term or term of studies including examinations, vacations and semester breaks.
- h) **Semester Duration:** A semester normally extends over a period of 15 class weeks. Each week has 30 hours of instruction spread over the week.
- i) **In-semester:** The word "in-semester" is used to refer to the continuous evaluation within the half-yearly term.
- j) **End-semester:** The word "end-semester" is used to refer to the terminal processes of examinations and evaluations at the end but within the half-yearly term.
- k) **Credit:** 'Credit' defines the quantum of contents/ syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required per week. Thus, normally in each of the course, credits will be assigned on the basis of the number of lectures/ tutorials/ laboratory work and other forms of learning required to complete the course contents in a 14-15 week schedule:
  - i) 1 Lecture per week = 1 Hour duration per week = 1 Credit
  - ii) 1 Tutorial per week = 1 Hour duration per week = 1 Credit
  - iii) 1 Practical per week = 2 Hours duration per week = 1 Credit Note

### Semester Duration:

- i) **Odd Semesters:** June–November (including end-semester examinations and semester breaks)
- ii) **Even Semester:** December–May (including end-semester examinations and semester breaks)

### Extent of Application:

The Regulations shall be applicable to the students enrolled for the Courses of Study leading to the Bachelor degrees in Arts (BA), Science (B.Sc.) and (B.Com), which shall be of three years duration distributed into six semesters.



### Academic Schedule:

The Academic Schedule of the Bachelor degrees in Arts (BA), Science (B.Sc.) and (B.Com) Programmes under the CBCS shall be administered as per the Academic Calendar of the University published for every academic session.

### Admission Notice and Admission Criteria:

- (i) Newspaper Notice inviting applications for admission into the different programmes shall be issued by the Principals of the colleges/ institutes as per the Academic Calendar of the University. The minimum eligibility for admission into the following Programmes shall be as below:
  - a. **Bachelor of Arts (B.A.):** A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University.
  - b. **Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.):** A student passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) in Science stream of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, or an equivalent examination (10+2) recognized as such by the University. For admission into the B.Sc. in Chemistry, Physics and Geology Honours, a candidate must pass the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) in Science stream of the Assam Higher Secondary Education Council or an equivalent examination with passing Mathematics as a subject.
- (ii) The admission or eligibility criteria shall be fixed by the Academic Council from time to time whenever necessary. The University/ colleges/ institutes may also adopt own policy for admission or selection of eligible candidates for admission complying with the eligibility criteria prescribed in the clause 2.5(i) of the CBCS legislation.
- (iii) No student shall be eligible for admission to an Academic Programme in any discipline unless he/she has successfully passed the qualifying examination fulfilling the minimum eligibility criteria from a University/ Institute recognized by Dibrugarh University. (iv) Statutory reservation policy of the government shall be followed in case of selection of eligible candidates for admission.

### Course Structure:

The Course Structure of the Academic Programmes under the CBCS shall be as per the Course Structure given in Annexure I. The nature of the Courses for all Under Graduate Academic programmes shall be as below:

- a) **Core Courses:** Compulsory components of an Academic Programme. These Courses are to be compulsorily studied as a core requirement for the programme. The contents of the Core Courses shall be as per the UGC Model Curriculum for the subject/ discipline concerned. However, the Boards of Studies concerned may recommend maximum of 20% deviation from the UGC Model Syllabi wherever requires. In case, UGC does not provide model Syllabi/ Curriculum, the Board of Studies shall propose their own Core Courses keeping parity of total numbers of credits/ courses with other similar subjects/ disciplines.
- b) **Elective Courses:** Elective courses shall be chosen by each student from a pool of courses. These courses may be intra-departmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) as well as inter-departmental, i.e., Generic Elective (GE). The students shall have to choose minimum number of DSE and GE in every semester as prescribed in the Course Structure. These courses shall be: (i) supportive to the discipline of study (ii) providing an expanded scope (iii) enabling an exposure to some other discipline/ domain (iv) nurturing student proficiency/ skill. There shall be a basket of at least eight Elective Courses having equal number of credits. For the students of the same discipline/ subjects these elective courses shall be intra-disciplinary and shall be called DSE Courses. If the students of other discipline/ subjects (within the Programme) opt these electives shall be considered as inter-disciplinary and shall be called GE Courses. Further, there may be few courses conducted under the UGC's Programmes on Massive Open Online Course (MOOCs). The University may time to time fix the criteria for MOOCs as per the relevant UGC Guidelines on digital education.
- c) **Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):** The Ability Enhancement Courses shall be of two kinds- 'Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses' and 'Skill Enhancement Courses'. These courses shall be inter-disciplinary (within the Programme) in nature. 'AEC' Courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement.
  - i. **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AEC):** (a) Environmental Science (2 Credit), (b) Communicative English (2 Credit) and (c) Alternative English/Communicative Hindi /ML (2 Credit).

*For BA and B.Com (Non-Honours) Programmes, there shall be a Multidisciplinary Course of 4 Credits.*
- ii. **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): (minimum 4 credits):** These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and lab/hands-on/training/fieldwork. The main purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability. The list provided under this category are suggestive in nature and



each University has complete freedom to suggest their own papers under this category based on their expertise, specialization, requirements, scope and need.

**A student may also take the form of a Dissertation/ Project work/ Practical training/ Field work/ Seminar, etc.**

A student shall have to study the academic programme as per the scheme of the Programme. Even if a candidate earns the required number of credits before completion of the full duration of the programme, he/she shall not be entitled for the degree.

#### Course Enrolment

1. The minimum and maximum credits to be opted by a student for qualifying of a graduate degree shall be as per the Course Structure given at the end of this statement.

2. Change of Courses shall not be permitted after sending the records of the students to the University for registration.

#### Attendance

1. The course teacher shall be responsible for maintaining a record of attendance of students who have enrolled for the course.

2. All course teachers shall intimate the Principal/ Director of a college/ Institute through the Head of the Department concerned at least thirty calendar days before the last instruction day in the semester, the particulars of all students who have less than 80% of attendance during the total number of class days.

3. A student who has less than 80% attendance in average shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination. Provided that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 70% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 80% attendance for valid reasons, on recommendation of the Head/Chairperson/ Principals of the Department/ Centre/ College on payment of a prescribed fee(s).

4. The Principals of the Colleges shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to take the End-semester examinations in the various courses and send a copy of the same to the Controller of Examinations. Such candidates shall have to repeat the concerned course (s) when it is offered next.

5. A student declared as discollegiate shall not be allowed to proceed to the next higher Semester. He/ She shall need to pursue the Semester afresh in which he/ she was declared as discollegiate along with the next fresh batch.

#### Examination and Evaluation

(a) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis, at least three times during each semester. (b) There shall be 20% marks for internal assessment and 80% marks for End-semester examination in each course during every semester. (c) There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the answer-scripts of the endsemester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.

(d) Internal Assessment: (i) In internal assessment, different tools such as objective tests, written tests, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work, etc. suitable to the courses may be employed. The Procedure for Internal Assessment is prescribed in Annexure III. (ii) The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall be required to compulsorily attend internal assessment including appearing the Sessional Tests, failing which they will not be allowed to appear for the End-semester examination. A student cannot repeat In-semester examinations. The department may arrange special in-semester examination whenever necessary.

(e) End Semester Examination: (i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80% Marks in each course of a Semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the Course. The End semester examination is normally a written/ laboratory-based examination/Project Work/Dissertation. (ii) The Controller of Examinations shall make necessary arrangements for notifying the dates of the End semester examinations and other procedures as per Dibrugarh University Rules (at least 20 days in advance) and the Academic Calendar notified by the University. (iii) Normally, the End-semester examination for each course shall be of three hour duration.

(f) Confidential Works: Setting of question papers, moderation of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts, scrutiny, tabulation of marks, etc. and announcement of results, shall be governed by the Dibrugarh University Examination Ordinance.

(g) The mode of the conduct of the end-semester examinations of the practical/ dissertation courses shall be partially external as below: 1. The end-semester examinations of all practical/ dissertation courses shall be conducted by a Board of Examiners consisting of the internal examiner (the concerned course teacher) and an external examiner appointed by the Controller of Examinations. 2. A student shall not be allowed to take more than one project work in a single semester.

(h) The mode of end-semester examination and evaluation of the Course shall be specified in the detailed syllabus of the Course concerned.

(i) End-semester Practical examinations shall normally be held before the theory examinations.

(k) Betterment Examination: (i) A student shall be entitled to take the "betterment examinations" in any two theory courses of any of the six semesters after passing the Sixth Semester examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The candidates shall have to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the Sixth Semester examination. (ii) No betterment shall be allowed in the practical examinations.

#### Results and Progression:

a) A candidate shall be declared as passed a course, provided he/ she secures-

(i) at least 40% of marks in each Course in the End Semester Examinations.

(ii) at least 'P' grade in the 10 point scale combining both the in-semester and End Semester Examination performance.

(iii) There shall be no separate pass mark for Internal Assessment.

b) A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester/ Programme, provided he/ she secures at least 'P' grade in the 10 point scale (given in clause ) in all the Courses separately.

c) There may be moderation of Internal Assessment marks/End Semester marks as and when necessary.

d) The marks of In-semester examinations obtained by the candidate shall be carried over for declaring any result.

e) A candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more courses of any end semester examinations up to Sixth Semester shall be provisionally promoted to the next higher semester with the failed course as carry over course(s). Such candidates will be eligible to appear in the carry over course in the next regular examinations of those courses.

f) If a candidate clears the sixth semester examination before clearing all the courses of the previous semesters, the result of the sixth semester examination of that candidate shall be withheld and his/ her results shall be announced only after he/ she clears the courses of the previous semesters.

**A student must clear all his/ her Semester Examinations within Six (6) years from the dates of admission to the First Semester of any Programme irrespective of the number of examinations appeared by the student, viz. First and Second Semester Examinations shall have to be cleared in six consecutive chances, Third and Fourth Semester Examinations shall have to be cleared in five consecutive chances and Fifth and Sixth Semester Examinations in four consecutive chances. However, after the first chance of the Fifth and Sixth Semester Examinations, the candidate shall be considered as a non-regular candidate.**

g) Since the Semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any programme in this system.

h) A candidate shall be declared to have passed the Bachelors Degree in the concerned discipline provided he/she has passed all the Semesters and in all the Courses separately.

i) The Controller of Examinations shall declare the results of the DU-UG CBCS Examinations and issue Grade-sheets.

j) The first rank holder of a programme shall be decided on the basis of the CGPA. However, the Overall Weighted Percentage of Marks (OWPM) of a candidate shall be considered in case of tie in CGPA.

#### Grading System

1. The absolute grading system shall be applied in evaluating performance of the students.

2. The following scale of grading system shall be applied to indicate the performances of students in terms of letter grade and grade points as given below :

P	Pass	5 (Marks securing above 40% – 50%)
F	Fail	0 (Marks securing below 40%)

\* Exclusive Class Interval technique shall be followed in calculation of Grade Point.



- The Letter grade 'B+' and above shall be considered as First Class and Letter grade 'B' shall be considered as Second Class.
- A student is considered to have completed a course successfully and earned the prescribed credits if he/she secures a letter grade other than F (Failed) or 'Abs' (Absent/Incomplete).
- If a candidate secures 'F' grade in a Course, he/she shall have to reappear in the Course in the next legitimate chance.
- If a student secures 'F' grade in Project Work/ Dissertation/ assignment etc., he/she shall have to re-submit it after necessary revisions. The Result shall be declared with next regular batch.
- 'Abs' grade shall be awarded to a candidate if he/she has not fulfilled the following requirements:
  - If a candidate fails to appear in any Course(s) in an end semester examination.
  - If a candidate fails to submit the project work/dissertation / assignment of an end semester examination.
  - If a candidate is certified as not eligible to appear in any course(s) in an end semester examination by the Teacher(s) due to insufficient attendance in lectures, tutorials, practical or field works.
- The candidates not appearing in a Semester Examination shall be considered as an 'Abs' candidate and that will be reflected in the Grade Sheet of the candidate. These candidate shall have to convert the 'Abs' grade by appearing in the next examination on the Course (provided he/ she has legitimate chance to appear the Course) concerned or by submitting project work/dissertation/ assignment etc.
- Results of the candidates appeared in the Betterment or Backlog Examinations shall not be counted for the award of Prizes/Medals, Rank or Distinction.

#### Transcript

The University may issue consolidated Transcript on payment of a prescribed fee which shall contain Letter grades, grade points and SGPA and CGPA mentioning the Course Titles in details, medium of instruction and programme duration.

#### Credit Transfer

Inter- Institutional transfer of Credits may be considered by the Dibrugarh University on reciprocal basis or in compliance with the relevant Guidelines of the UGC.

#### Rules for Admission on Transfer from other University :

- The University shall allow admission on transfer of students from other Universities. However, such transfer shall be permissible provided that -
  - both the Universities conduct the same degree programmes under the CBCS.
  - the course structure along with the nomenclature of the courses are similar between the two Universities,
  - the combination of courses opted by the candidate are not changed.
- In fulfillment of the conditions as laid down in clause 11 (a), a candidate may be allowed to get admission on transfer from other Universities on production of transfer certificate, proof of classes attended, migration certificate, etc. not later than 1 (one) month from the commencement of the classes of the semester concerned. The records of class attendance, performance in internal assessment in his/her credit shall be carried over on admission and shall be computed for the purpose of examination. With such permission of transfer, the Credits earned by the student shall also be accepted by the University.
- A candidate shall have to apply for transfer in the prescribed format of the University.

#### General:

- It shall be ensured that the University shall maintain fundamental code of professional ethics in implementing these Regulations.
- For any matter not covered under these Regulations for the DU UGCBCS Programmes, the existing Dibrugarh University Rules, Ordinances and the Dibrugarh University Act, 1965 (as amended) shall be applicable.
- The Dibrugarh University CBCS Board and/or the Examination Committee of the University shall remove any difficulty, which may arise in the course of operations relating to execution of the DU CBCS programmes.

### Rules for Internal Assessment in B.A./B.Sc. Programmes in Semester System

- The marks allotted for Internal Assessment (20%) in each course shall be based on the following:
  - Sessional Examination I (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
  - Sessional Examination II (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
  - Seminar/ Group Discussion: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
  - Attendance: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- Each sessional examination shall be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the course. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answer scripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The teacher concerned shall fix the date of the sessional examination of each course complying with the Academic Calendar of the University.
- The students shall have to write the answers in the scripts provided and duly authenticated by the college/ institute concerned.
- After evaluation, the answer scripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this, the answer scripts should be collected back from the students.
- There shall be no provision for "repeat"/ "betterment" in the sessional examination. If a student misses any sessional examination for unavoidable reasons, the concerned teacher may allow the student to appear in a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
- The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.
- If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall conduct the process of internal assessment together.
- If any student fails to appear in internal assessment, he/she shall not be eligible to appear in the end semester examinations of the course(s) concerned. The colleges/ institutes shall notify the same prior to filling up forms for examinations.
- At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examinations begin) the concerned College shall submit the internal assessment marks in proper format to the University.
  - The University may call the answer scripts from the colleges/ institute at any time during the academic sessions.



## GENERAL RULES of Bahona College

- It is obligatory to attend classes regularly. A student is required to obtain a minimum of 80% attendance of the total lectures delivered on each academic session failing of which he or she will be debarred from appearing in the examination. He or she may also have to forfeit the seat.
- All students are required to attend in college uniform.
- All Societies & Associations of the college shall be subject to guidance & control of the college authority.
- Only societies recognised by the authority shall have access to the facilities of the college campus.
- All notices desired to be circulated by the Students Union in the college premises shall require the prior approval of the Principal.
- Any of the following acts by a student will be considered as punishable offence -
  - Habitual irregularity.
  - Indulgence in any kind of violent activities .
  - Disobedience & indecent behaviour towards teachers, non-teaching staff, support staff, visitors & the college authority.
  - Damaging, defacing or devaluing any college property.
- Use of mobile phones within the campus is restricted at canteen, common rooms and at departmental rooms with due permission.
- The campus of the college has already been declared a 'Tobacco Free Zone'. So use of tobacco in the college campus is punishable as per law.
- No Student shall take recourse to any social media for expressing his/her grievances. The Students Grievances Redressal Cell should be approached first for such grievances. Violation of this rule will invite stern disciplinary measures.

### Registration and Migration

Students from Boards or Universities other than SEBA, AHSEC and DU shall have to produce migration certificates before registration.

### Identity Card

Identity cards are issued to the students after a few days of admission. Students are to carry this card when they come to college and must produce it whenever necessary.

### Uniform

Boys - White shirt and black trousers.

Girls - Navy blue kurta and white churidar /salwar or navy blue blouse, white chador and muga or similar coloured mekhela.

**Note :** Wearing college uniform is mandatory. There is separate uniform for Community College; No uniform for Career Orientation Courses and Distance Education Courses





## ACADEMIC FACILITIES

### Library

Bahona College has a central library and 12 departmental libraries. The central library is fully automated with Koha ILMMS and Barcode technology. It has 35000+ printed books and subscriptions to 6 printed journals, 8 newspapers, and 10 magazines. It has 1147 reference books, rare books, Minor and Major Research Project Reports, Ph.D. Thesis and College Magazines. The library conducts a stock verification process every 2 years. The library has a reading room with 50+ seating capacity. There is a separate reading area for the faculty members. The library is open from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM on all working days. HS students can borrow 2 books for 14 days, Degree students can borrow 3 books for 14 days, faculty members can borrow 6 books for 180 days and other staff can borrow 5 books for 90 days. There is a library advisory committee for library management. The library purchases new books as per the requisition given by the faculty members and students. Library also has a purchase suggestion register where library users can suggest books to be purchased. The library orientation program is carried out for new students in which details about the library collection, services, timing, and doubts of students if any are cleared. College Library has automated itself by adopting several measures like

#### ILMS in the Library:

Bahona College Library is fully automated by using Koha ILMMS and Barcode technology.



#### Barcode Attendance:

Barcode-based attendance system for both students and staff.

#### Book Browsing:

The holdings of the library can be searched using Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC).

#### Digital Library:

It has a separate digital library section with 5 computers and all are connected to the internet. There is a separate login register for the digital library section.

#### Wi-Fi-based Library:

Library users can use the Wi-Fi service in the reading hall and in the digital library section.

#### Membership of E-Contents:

The Library is a member of the NLIST and also a club member of NDLI. The users can access 199500+ E-books and 6000+E-journals available in the NLIST database and 6,00,000 E-books through NDLI.

#### WhatsApp-based Circulation:

Students of Bahona College are connected with the library through WhatsApp Groups. Library-related information is shared in those groups.

#### Online Book Requisition System:

Students and teachers can request or suggest book purchases using WhatsApp, or email service or may fill in and submit a book requisition form.

#### Online Booking:

In every fortnight, the library shares photographs of 15 randomly selected books for teachers. Teachers may book their books just by sending a message to the group.

#### QR Code-based Service:

The library provides an online Old Question Paper access facility to its users by using a QR code.

#### ID card Printing and other Services:

The library prints College ID cum Library Card for all the stakeholders of Bahona College using the college web portal. A reprographic facility is also available for library users. The college library is under CCTV surveillance.

Every year books exhibition has been conducted by the library where students purchase books. Bahona College Library also conducts workshops and training programs for library professionals.

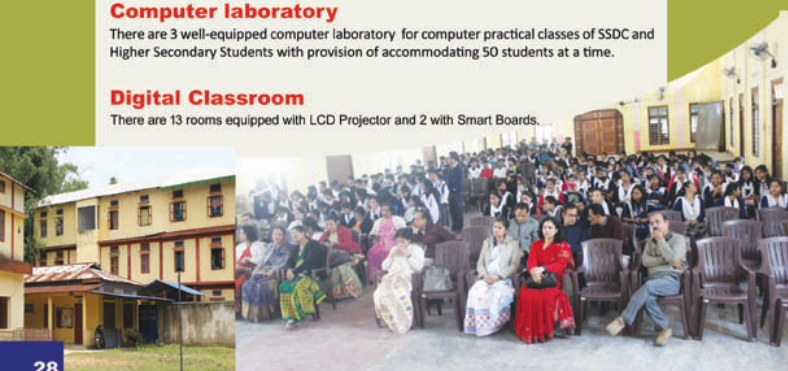

## INSTITUTIONAL BIOTECH-HUB (IBT-Hub)

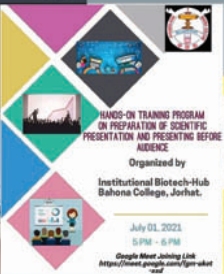
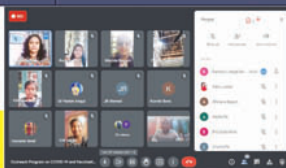

# STUDENTS' SUPPORT

## Mentoring

The college has introduced the system of mentoring the students by maintaining a mentoring register and diary at departmental level. In this system the academic responsibility of a group of students is fixed on a particular faculty who provides personal care and guidance to the students registered under him. Currently, WhatsApp mentoring is growing.

## Govt. Scholarships

Students belonging to SC, ST, OBC are entitled to govt. scholarships. The scholarship holders are required to observe strict discipline and maintain regular class attendance.

- ❖ Puspadhar Kharghariya Memorial Trust Scholarship (This scholarship will be offered to two meritorious but economically poor students of Charigaon Mouza, Jorhat on getting admission in to H.S. 1st year at Bahona College.)

Besides these, the departments have their individual schemes of scholarships and financial aid.

## Book Grant

All the departments have departmental libraries and book banks. Apart from issuing books from departmental libraries at periodical basis, book grant is provided to the needy students from the book bank for an academic session.

## Free Studentship

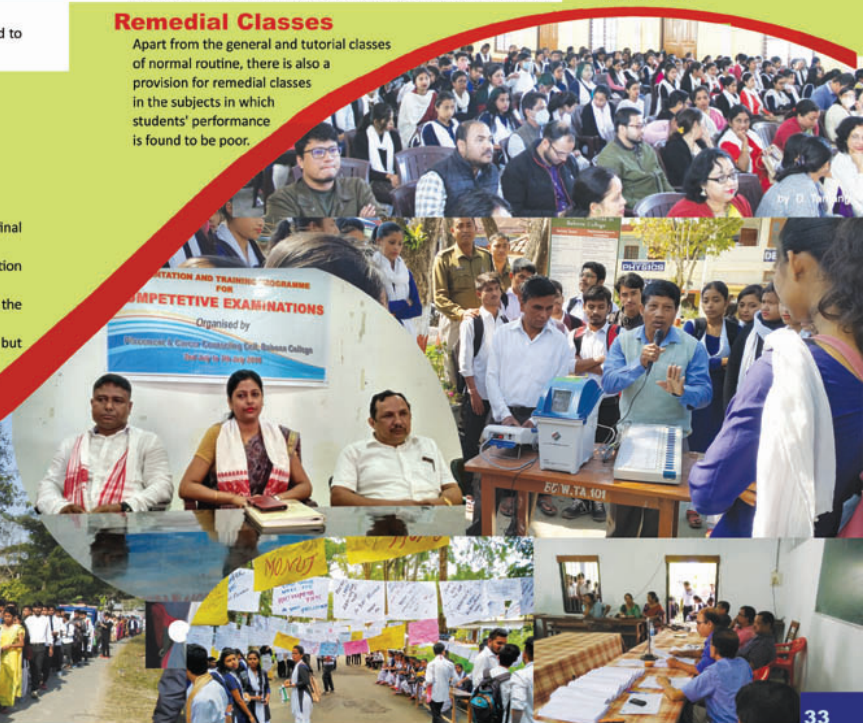
The college has provisions of cent percent or partial free studentship on merit-cum mean basis, particularly for students of BPL families. Some need-based fees relaxation provisions are also there for meritorious and regular students of economically backward families.

## Remedial Classes

Apart from the general and tutorial classes of normal routine, there is also a provision for remedial classes in the subjects in which students' performance is found to be poor.

## Students Aid Fund

The college has a Students Aid Fund to help the needy and meritorious students. Aid is offered in both cash and kind.





### Course counselling

A programme of course counselling is held in the college before admission and its date is notified either in the notice board or published in the local news paper.

### Career counselling

Programmes of career counselling, particularly for the final year students are held from time to time and students are made aware of the job opportunities in different fields. There is also a Career Counselling Cell to collect career information and bring it to the notice of the students.

### Coaching classes for entry in different services

The college has been providing coaching for entry into certain jobs to the outgoing students as well as educated and unemployed youth either free of cost or at nominal cost.

### Study tours

The college has provisions of study tours with the assistance from college fund and also with government/UGC financial assistance. The tours are meant either for field study or for educational excursions.

### Workshop on students' course performance

The Academic Development Cell of the College organizes programmes and workshops to assist the students in their academic performances.

### Motivational programmes

Motivational programmes are organized periodically in the college focussing on self-employment and development of local potentials and entrepreneurial skills.

### Awareness programmes

Students are also made aware of socio-economic-environmental issues as well as health hazards through certain programmes organized either by the college or in collaboration with NGOs & GOs. The college also provides infrastructural facilities to social activists.

### Provisions for differently abled students

The college administration and the departments try to provide special care for differently abled students. Measures are taken to assimilate the students with the general student fraternity. First bench are reserved for student with PWD Category. There are ramps, with rods for PWD Students. College has disable friendly toilets.

### Alumni support

The alumni organization of the college is actively working for students' support through different programmes and projects. The alumni of the college successfully established in different fields are invited to the college on different occasions to interact with the students which may inspire and motivate them to strive for success.

### Feed Back Support

Feed back from students, faculties and parents are taken on course, routine, teaching-learning quality, accommodation, atmosphere, administration etc. and necessary support and corrective steps are taken there after.



### Students Self Employment Counselling Centre

This cell organizes counselling and training programmes for students' self employment. It also organizes exhibition programmes to familiarize the students with local opportunities for self employment .

### Students' Grievance Cell

This cell addresses the complaints and problems of the students. The cell is managed by a special committee to analyze the complaints or grievances and to suggest corrective measures to the authority.

### SOPAAN....the ladder

It is a newly established student support fund managed by the teachers of the college under the chairmanship of the Principal. The fund offers financial support to needy and meritorious students to pursue higher education. Donations are accepted from people both inside and outside the college fraternity to benefit a greater number of students.

### Orientation Course

The IQAC has introduced an Orientation Course for the students of SSDC to fill the lapse in mission of the College, not met by the regular courses.

### Health Care Cell

The health care centre of Bahona College works for - blood group registration, studying health problems of the students and taking follow up actions, organizing medical camps and communicating with medical departments and doctors in emergency situations during working hours and when the periodical health check up programmes are organized. The Health Care Centre is patronized by the Public Health Centre, Saraimaria Gaon and Collaborated by Enajori, a local NGO working for blood donation.

### Internal Complaints Committee

Internal Complaints Committee has been formed to make the stakeholders of the college more gender sensitive and to provide judicial and counseling services to the needy ones in the context gender issues.

### Reservation under Community Extension Care Programme

One seat in both Science and Arts Streams is reserved for students coming from the village under Extension Care Programme.

### Amar Alosona

Amar Alosona is an Online Discussion Programme under the aegis of IQAC, Bahona College. It was initially conceptualised in the year 2020 during the pandemic-induced lockdown. The purpose of the exercise was to facilitate a virtual platform where students across disciplines can join, learn from and interact with eminent individuals and experts from diverse fields. The discussions were organised and managed by a team of dynamic faculties and office staff of Bahona College led by Dr. Pankaj Bora. Resource persons from across the country were invited to deliver lectures on a wide array of topics encompassing Sciences, Humanities, Culture, Literature, Career Planning, Personality Development, Finance, Politics, Healthcare and Technology etc. A total number of 10 episodes were aired in the year 2020. The programme was revamped in 2021 for a Second Season with 10 more episodes. The video recordings of each of the episodes are publicly available on YouTube, and in the college website.



# CO-CURRICULAR, EXTRA CURRICULAR PROGRAMMES AND CELEBRATIONS

The college encourages creative development of the students through various co-curricular and extra curricular activities. It provides them with an environment where they can bring to the fore their latent talents and perform creditably in events and meets.

## National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The college runs a three year course for NCC cadets of boys with an enrolment capacity 100. Central funding has been made available to enable the cadets to participate in various training camps. Students may join NCC which offers job prospects in the Indian Defence Services, CRPF, Para Military Forces, Indian Railways etc. Many Multinational and Private Companies give employment opportunities to students with B and C certificates of NCC. Present NCC officer : Dilip Tamang, Department of Botany.

## National Social Service (NSS)

The college unit of NSS has strength of 50 male and 50 female volunteers. During last three years the NSS wing performs its various regular activities like campus cleaning and beautification, plantation, awareness camps in nearby villages, competition among the students to create awareness regarding various hazards and health problems, blood donation camps in collaboration with other agencies etc. Present Programme officer : Mr. Bhaskar Duwarah, Asst. Professor, Department of Botany.

## Cultural Development Cell

The cultural centre has been set up with the objective to introduce the students to the culture, values and intrinsic ideals at the local and national level. To this end, the centre organizes programmes to bring out the latent talents among the students and to recognize the local artists dedicated to working in this field. In certain programmes this cell collaborates with local NGO such as 'Enajori', 'Lohitya' etc, working for the cause of cultural and social development.

## Bahona College Film Society

Bahona College has also set up a film society - "Annweshan" with the objective of developing educative values and appreciation of good cinema among the students.

## Chatra Bikash Kendra

This Centre has been set up to introduce the students to the Indian traditional spiritual values to the students. It encourages and conducts training on yoga, pranayam etc. in the College campus. This Cell also organises programmes to teach life saving skills to the students through Martial Arts and the likes.

## Bi-annual Inter-College Debating Competition

## Community Extension Services

The vision statement of the College reflects commitment to serve for community development. The mission here is to orient the students local eco-political, environmental and social issues. In community extension services the college is committed to the motto of "Rural Development". To foster Rural Economy, Community Extension Cell of Bahona College has tried to establish a linkage between the neighboring villages and Market. It has organized a Trade Fair in 2021 where local SHGs, small entrepreneurs and start-ups got the opportunity to boost their businesses. College carries out several community services led by different cells and wings. These are –

3. Science and environmental awareness and environment protection programmes organized by the Science Society
4. Programmes on women causes organized by Women Cell
5. Programme for medical help and guide by Health Care Centre

8. Workshops on occupational skill development of neighbouring people
9. Collaborative effort with NGOs- SEWA, Astitva, Louhitya, Enajori etc.

## Village under extension care

The College has brought two backward villages viz Kakila Kumar Gaon, and Mout Gaon, under the care of Community Extension Cell and Borali gaon, Bahona Nath gaon, Dahikhoor muslim gaon, Komarmati gaon and Soronia suburi under Unnat Bharat Abhijan. The objective were to study the socio-economic and environmental issues of the villages and to make effort for development in collaboration with the local NGO 'SHEWA'. The Cell has already made an extensive household survey in the villages. This Programme attempts to perform the following activities –

1. Organization of six monthly Health Camp by Health Care Center
2. Organization programmes by Women Cell
3. Concessional studentship under distance education of the College
4. Reservation of 1 seat each in SSDC of both Science and Arts
5. Preference of education care services to the students of this village
6. Monitoring health issues by Women Cell and Health Care Center
7. Organizing six monthly skill development programme

## Women Cell of Bahona College

The Women cell of Bahona college was established in 2004 with a sincere attempt to bring about a radical improvement in the condition of the women and girls in and around the rural area of Bahona. Women Cell is so far extending helping hands to the women of this area through funds voluntarily contributed by the members. This Cell time to time organizes free medical camp, blood donation camps, camps of skill development, programmes of professional quality development of women etc. The Cell has also already organized five-day SAM workshop entitled "Women's Success in achieving Higher Education"; one day workshop entitled "Women and Work" under the guidance and supervision of " Rosa Luxemburg Foundation". Apart from awareness programmes of gender issues, the cell is regularly celebrating the 'International Women's Day'. The Cell has already published 'Annweshan', a collection of articles on 8th March, 2017.

Women Cell will start "Late Pranati Duwarah Bora Memorial Award" for students from this session

The women cell has organised Poster and Slogan competitions along with a Street play to mark the celebration of International Women's Day on 8th March, 2019. Program to felicitate personalities involved in social works and entrepreneur had also been undertaken. Awareness programme regarding various health related issues of the girls was also arranged in the nearby schools. Relief materials were distributed among poverty stricken families during the pandemic period. Recitation competition was held amongst the students of the adjoining schools and Resource person was invited to deliver speech on the topic: 'Health and Security of girl child'. A two day virtual National Webinar on "Peace, Security and Social Justice: Impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on Women" was organized on 20th & 21st July, 2020. A book "Covid - 19: Negotiating the Immediate and Beyond" was released on 18th April, 2021. This book has been selected for the Library of Congress, Washington DC, US.



## Assam Science Society, Bahona Branch

Bahona College is the headquarter of Assam Science Society, Bahona Branch that works for the growth of scientific viewpoint, science education, environmental education, health education etc. Besides the various activities to popularize science among mass people and students of various schools and colleges of north-east Jorhat, the branch regularly organizes Science Teachers Training Programme, Popular Talks, Science Quiz Competition, Blood donation and Eye donation awareness programme, Science Festival, Science Poster Competition etc and observes National Science Day, World Environmental Day, World AIDS day etc. The society also organizes lectures and demonstration classes based on high school level science course in different high schools of the neighbouring region.

## GUIDELINES for Students' Entitlement

These guidelines have been issued by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in order to help students, teachers, administrators and institutions understand what the minimum entitlements of the students are. These guidelines apply to all the colleges and universities in the country [this expression includes every institutions of higher education even if it is not called college/university] without any exception. It shall be mandatory for every college/university to publish the present Guidelines in full in its Prospectus and also post it on the homepage of its website.

Fulfillment of these entitlements imposes obligations on educational institutions, administrators, policy makers, teachers and students themselves. If these obligations are not met, a student can approach the Grievance Redressal Authority or the Ombudsman. Any serious or persistent violation of these Guidelines can be brought to the notice of the University Grants Commission and can be the basis of punitive action against the offender.

Some of the provisions stated here are already covered by existing laws or Rules and Regulations of the UGC. But the students shall continue to enjoy all the right under existing laws, rules and regulations which may not have been mentioned in these Guidelines.

### 1. Admission

- 1.1. An announcement or advertisement for any course of study must clearly specify whether the degree granted is notified by the UGC and other relevant statutory authorities [Under Section 22 c of the UGC Act, latest list available at the UGC website] and whether the university that awards the degree figures in the list of universities maintained by the UGC [available at the UGC website].
- 1.2. A student seeking admission is entitled to a document (usually called 'Prospectus') that specifies the curricula including syllabi, names and academic profile and status of the faculty, mode and frequency of evaluation, duration of the course, academic calendar, comprehensive information about fees or charges of any kind, and refund rules. The information given in the prospectus should not be changed to the disadvantage of the student during the course of study; any change if necessary must be communicated to each student individually spelling out reasons for such a change.



- 1.3. The Prospectus must spell out exactly the process and criteria for admissions. This includes weightage given to previous academic performance, entrance examination and interview. The syllabi and format of the entrance examination must be spelled out. The final scores of each candidate who appeared for entrance examination including all the components and the entire waiting list must be made public.
- 1.4. Information about any reservations or quota for any category, the eligibility criteria for these reservations/quotas, certificate required for seeking admission under these must be stated clearly in the Prospectus.
- 1.5. The student must not be asked to produce documents which have not been mentioned in the Prospectus. While the institution can ask the student to produce the original documents (such as School Leaving Certificate, Marksheet, Caste certificate) for verification, they cannot retain any original documents of any students. [As notified by UGC on 23rd April 2007, F. No. 1-3/2007 (CPP II)]

## 2. Quality of teaching and learning

- 2.1. It is the responsibility of the college/university to help the students develop their learning skills by facilitating the creation of learner centric environment conducive for quality education. The students are entitled to receiving instruction and reading material in all the languages allowed by the institution as medium of instruction or examination.
- 2.2. The students who begin with a difficulty due to social handicap or a shift in the medium of instruction are entitled to special support to bridge the gap.
- 2.3. The students are entitled to availability and presence of qualified teacher, fulfilment of the specified number of teaching days and contact hours for each course and completion of syllabus on time. [UGC Regulations on Minimum Qualification of Teachers... 2010]
- 2.4. The students are entitled to reasonable access to facilities, services and resources including library (that stocks textbooks, reference books, journals, e-resources), laboratories, and ICT facilities in the languages permitted as medium of instruction or examination.
- 2.5. The student are entitled to fair, transparent and timely evaluation, including fair provisions for timely re-checking or re-evaluation of the scripts and redressal of any grievance related to the evaluation process. The students are entitled to a copy of their answer scripts after the declaration of results.



- 2.6. The students are entitled to timely conduct of examination and declaration of results as specified in the academic calendar in the Prospectus. They shall be entitled to the award of degree within 180 days of the declaration of results.
- 2.7. The students are entitled to give regular feedback on the quality of teaching, students services and institutional infrastructure. The college/university shall establish mechanisms for seeking this feedback regularly and taking student feedback into account for review and improvement.

## 3. Fee and financial aid

- 3.1. The students are entitled to prior and full information about amount, components, frequency and mode of any kind of payment including fees or charges of any other kind and refund rules. If a student withdraws before the beginning of the course, the student should be refunded the entire fee given to it with a maximum deduction of Rs. 1000. [As notified by UGC on 23rd April 2007, F. No. 1-3/2007 (CPP II)]
- 3.2. A college/university will make utmost effort to ensure that no student is deprived of opportunities of quality education for lack of sufficient financial resources. It is the responsibility of the policy makers to ensure that sufficient funds are made available to implement this principle. The Prospectus shall contain consolidated information about scholarship/fellowship/financial aid scheme of any type that is available to the students. It shall bring to notice and assist the students in accessing such schemes. It shall ensure that the procedure for selection is fair and transparent.

## 4. Infrastructure

- 4.1. The students are entitled to access to appropriate resources including classrooms, libraries, laboratories and other academic facilities necessary for quality education. [UGC rules and regulations for fitness of universities and colleges for Grants under section 12 B of the UGC Act 1956, Private University Regulation, Deemed University Regulation].
- 4.2. The students are entitled to reasonable access to sports and recreation facilities, avenues for literary, aesthetic and other extra-curricular pursuits.
- 4.3. The student are entitled to reasonable attention to medical and health requirements including free and periodic health check-up and treatment/hospitalization in case of medical emergencies.
- 4.4. The students are entitled to a reasonable access to adequate, clean and hygienic hostel/residence accommodation that provides basic amenities including recreational facilities. Such accommodation should be affordable and must not be utilized by the institution for profit making. Accommodation meant for students must not be encroached upon by the institution for any other purpose.





- 4.5. Student with disability are entitled to access to all schemes, facilities and services in the university without discrimination. The college/university shall strive towards a universal design of learning based curriculum that can address the needs of the broadest possible range of students by minimizing barriers and maximizing learning for all students. The college/university shall provide barrier free access, special library resources (including Braille and ICT resources), provisions for sign language interpreter/transcriber, the required equipments and electronic resources and the required relaxation in examination to all students with disability. [Person with Disabilities (Equal Opportunity, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995; UGC D.O.No.F-6-1/2006(CPIII), F.No.6-1/2012(SCT)]
5. The students are entitled to non-discriminatory treatment (in the sense of absence of harassment, victimization or exclusion) in every aspect of institutional functioning. Any discrimination based on caste, gender, creed, colour, race, religion, place of birth, political conviction, language and disability shall be prohibited.
- 5.1. In particular, institutions shall not discriminate against students belonging to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes and racial profiling of students from any region or ethnic group. [UGC (Promotion of Equity in Higher Educational Institutions) Regulations, 2012]
- 5.2. The students are entitled to protection from sexual harassment by complaining to the Gender Sensitization Committees against Sexual Harassment. It is mandatory for each college/university to constitute and publicize this committee as per the Guidelines and norms laid down by the Hon'ble Supreme Court [Vishaka and Others Vs. State of Rajasthan and Others(JT 1997 (7) SC 384)] 5.3. All students are entitled to protection from ragging in any form [UGC (Curbing the Menace of Ragging) Regulation, 2009]
6. As democratic citizens, the students are entitled to freedom of thought and expression within and outside their institution. The college/university must allow space for free exchange of ideas and public debate so as to foster a culture of critical reasoning and questioning. College/university authorities must not impose unreasonable, partisan or arbitrary restrictions on organizing seminars, lecture and debates that do not otherwise violate any law.
7. The students are entitled to forming associations and unions, directly electing their representatives to Students Unions and having their representatives on the college/university decision making bodies including internal quality assessment, grievance committees, Gender Sensitization Committees against Sexual Harassment and the Academic/Executive council. University/colleges shall evolve mechanisms for adequate consultations with students' representatives before taking any major decision affecting the students.
8. The students are entitled to full and correct information about any institution of higher education in which they study or propose to study. Therefore, every college/university must disclose the following information on its website and Prospectus: status of the institution, its affiliation, accreditation rating, physical assets and amenities, membership of governing bodies and minutes of the meetings of bodies like Academic/Executive council, sources of income and the financial situation and any other information about its functioning necessary for a student to make a fully informed choice. [Section 4 (1) of Right to Information Act 2005]
9. The students are entitled to redressal of their grievance by the Grievance Redressal Committee of the institution within 10 days of making a representation. If they are not satisfied, they are also entitled to an appeal to the Ombudsman of the University concerned for redressal within 30 days. [UGC (Grievance Redressal) Regulations, 2012]
10. The UGC may issue instructions for proper implementation of these Guidelines.
